A shroud-wrapped mummiform male ushabti wearing a plain tripartite wig and a broad plaited divine beard. The arms are crossed right over left on the chest and clenched hands protrude from the shroud to hold a hoe in the left and a pick in the right. The right hand also holds the rope of a small basket with square-hatched detail that is carried behind the left shoulder. The face is quite square in shape and has very wellmodelled details. The cheeks are chubby and the chin is quite fleshy. The mouth has a pleasant smile, the nose is broad and the eyes are almond-shaped and slightly bulging and with eyebrows modelled. A pair of ears protrude in front of the lappets of the wig. The figure stands against a dorsal pillar that is separated from the rear lappet of the wig by a horizontal groove and stands upon a trapezoidal base. A single vertical column of an incised hieroglyphic inscription with framing lines names the owner as Ah-mose¹ (Born of the Moon), born to Ta-di-Bastet² (Gift of Bastet). The ms of the name Ah–mose is used haplographically for ms n – born to. Ah–mose has the title God's Servant of Horus.

There are areas of blue on the back of the *ushabti*, this being the original colour of the glaze.

Database of parallel ushabtis for Ah-mose

From a study of parallel examples to be found in museum collections, private collections and those offered for sale at auctions and by dealers (images are not to scale).

Shroud—wrapped mummiform male; original blue glazed faience now mostly degraded to green or brown; wears a plain tripartite wig quite low on the forehead; the chin sports a plaited divine beard that is broad and curled upwards at its tip; the face is square in shape with chubby cheeks and well modelled facial details; the mouth has a pleasant smile; eyes are large, almond—shaped and somewhat bulbous; eyebrows are added; ears protrude in the front of the lappets of the wig; the arms are crossed right over left above the waist; clenched hands hold a pair of hoes that are modelled in shallow relief; a small and sometimes indistinct basket with square—hatched detail is carried behind the left shoulder being held by a faintly modelled cord that is held in the right hand; the *ushabti* is supported by a dorsal pillar that is separated from the rear lappet of the wig by a horizontal groove; the figure stands upon a trapezoidal base; a vertical column of an incised hieroglyphic inscription with framing lines gives the name and title of the owner as God's Servant of Horus, Ah—mose, born to Ta—di—Bastet.
